Part A: Pupil Premium Strategy Plan

Statement of Intent

Kingfisher Primary School is a 1-form entry primary school that serve a community with a higher than average proportion of disadvantaged pupils. The school has strong values and a committed and dedicated staff team. We believe that the highest possible standards can only be achieved by having the highest expectations of all learners, knowing each child as an individual and tailoring the support to precisely meet their needs. Raising the attainment of disadvantaged pupils and closing the gap with their peers remains a key priority.

The challenges facing disadvantaged pupils and their families are varied and there is no “one size fits all”, however, we are dedicated to closing the attainment gap and raising proportions of greater depth for these identified pupils. Common factors affecting pupil premium pupils include: lack of support at home, poor language and communication skills, lack of confidence and limited life experiences. There may also be more complex family circumstances that prevent children from flourishing.

Our ultimate objectives for our disadvantaged pupils are:

- To significantly reduce the attainment gap between disadvantaged and non-disadvantaged pupils across all subject areas through our exceptional provision
- To work in partnership with our families, providing support where it is needed so that the academic, social and emotional needs of all our pupils are met with equity
- To secure the delivery of an exceptional curriculum through expert teaching that is characterised by great subject knowledge, purposeful feedback and accurate assessment

We aim to do this by:

- Securing high quality teaching and learning in all curriculum areas that will meet the needs of all pupils
- Driving an assessment and analysis approach that is robust, ensuring accuracy and championing our culture of 100% achievement for all
- Delivering a meticulously planned and evaluated curriculum with experiences and opportunities designed to develop skills of creativity, innovation and independence
- Communicating carefully with families so they have the tools and where necessary the resources to support their children to learn successfully at school
- Providing targeted support to families who need it through tea and toast sessions, coffee mornings, drop ins and workshops
- Offering a broad and wide reaching extra-curricular provision that includes clubs, trips and visitors that widen horizons and enhance cultural capital

Challenges

This details the key challenges to achievement that we have identified among our disadvantaged pupils.

Challenge number	Detail of challenge
1	<p>Our attendance data over the last 3 years indicates that attendance among disadvantaged pupils has been between 1.2% and 2.9% lower than non-disadvantaged pupils.</p> <p>8.4%-14% of disadvantaged pupils have been “persistently absent” (below 90%) compared to 3.9%-12.8% of their peers in the last 3 years. It is clear that their absenteeism negatively impacts pupils’ progress and achievement, especially the disadvantaged children.</p>
2	<p>Assessments, observations, and discussions with pupils entering the school indicate underdeveloped oral language skills and vocabulary gaps among many disadvantaged pupils. Speech, Language and Communication development is significantly behind that of non-disadvantaged pupils.</p> <p>On entry to Reception classes in the last 3 years, between 25% - 50% of our disadvantaged pupils arrive below age-related expectations compared to 42% - 51% of other pupils.</p>
3	<p>The life experiences of many of our disadvantaged pupils are not as varied, diverse or rich as those of our non-disadvantaged pupils, widening the attainment gap across the curriculum. Disadvantaged pupils typically have limited out of school enriching experiences of visiting places of interest, in order to stimulate discussion and imagination which impacts their vocabulary development.</p>
4	<p>Our disadvantaged pupil’s well-being and educational needs are not always met effectively at home, and this, coupled with low aspirations and a lack of expectation can impact on our disadvantaged pupil’s attainment. Parents of disadvantaged pupils can be harder to reach and reluctant to engage. Referrals for support remain high in school and to external agencies.</p> <p>43% of disadvantaged pupils currently require additional support with social and emotional needs who are receiving small group interventions, ELSA support and external professional agency involvement.</p> <p>Additional pupils receive general pastoral support.</p>
5	<p>Our disadvantaged pupils tend to enter school with attainment that is significantly behind that of their non-disadvantaged peers. Lower outcomes in reading and writing for disadvantaged children as a result of a lack of exposure at home to high quality reading provision. Disadvantaged pupils do not typically read as widely as pupils from non-disadvantaged backgrounds. This gap narrows over time but remains significant at the end of KS2.</p> <p>Internal and external assessments indicate that maths attainment among disadvantaged pupils is significantly below that of non-disadvantaged pupils, particularly at Greater Depth.</p>

<p>3) Raise the attainment of disadvantaged pupils across the wider curriculum.</p>	<p>Disadvantaged children access a broad and diverse curriculum which is tailored to meet the needs of the individuals and to widen the horizons and cultural capital of our pupils.</p> <p>Clubs and enrichment activities are tailored to the needs of the community, leading to an increased and sustained increase in participation.</p>
<p>4) To achieve and sustain improved wellbeing for all pupils in our school, particularly our disadvantaged pupils so the barriers to learning are reduced.</p>	<p>Sustained high levels of wellbeing by 2026/27 are demonstrated by qualitative data from pupil voice, parent surveys and teacher observations.</p> <p>A significant increase in participation in enrichment activities, particularly among disadvantaged pupils with educational activities impacting positively on children's self-esteem and achievement.</p>

<p>5) Raise attainment for disadvantaged pupils in Reading and Writing and the development of oracy skills with improved reading attainment among disadvantaged pupils.</p>	<p>Disadvantaged children develop a love of reading through accessing a wide range of texts. Phonics achievement of pupil's eligible for pupil premium is in line with non-pupil premium children. KS2 expected reading outcomes in 2026/27 show that the gap between disadvantaged pupils and non-disadvantaged pupils has continued to narrow and remains lower than the National gap. KS2 maths exceeding outcomes in 2026/27 demonstrate an upward trajectory of pupils attaining the higher standard in maths.</p>

Part B: Review of Outcomes in the Previous Academic Year

Outcomes for Disadvantaged Pupils 2023/24

The strategic use of Pupil Premium funding is a priority for Kingfisher Primary School, guided by the three pillars of Proud Traditions, Wide Horizons and High Achievement. The use of the funding has been carefully managed to ensure that the most under-resourced children within our school community benefit from provision that prepares them for the next stage of their education and beyond.

Moderation and teacher assessments consistently highlight the positive impact targeted funding has on children, and this is reflected in their academic performance and overall well-being. Pupil voice and external validation affirm Kingfisher as a nurturing and inspiring environment for everyone. The establishment of, and the ongoing development of positive relationships, particularly with hard to reach families, continues to be prioritised with leaders working tirelessly to offer the very best educational opportunities to every child.

Outcome 1 - Attainment gaps between disadvantaged and non-disadvantaged pupils are reduced, particularly in EYFS and KS1

Disadvantaged pupils tend to enter Kingfisher with attainment that is significantly below that of their non-disadvantaged peers. The challenges of the pandemic have left a lasting legacy and have widened this gap, particularly in areas such as speech and language and social skills.

- As a result of early identification, needs and gaps of disadvantaged children are addressed through bespoke interventions and targeted support.
- 67% of children in receipt of pupil premium met GLD from very low starting points, above the Pupil Premium National data figure of 51.6% in 2022-23.
- Our transition plan into Year 1 ensures that children's Early Years needs are being met whilst they also begin learning within the KS1 curriculum.
- The progress of our pupil premium children through EYFS is accelerated in all areas and exceeds the progress of children who are not pupil premium.

Outcome 2 - Raise attainment of disadvantaged pupils in reading, writing and maths across the school and Outcome 3 - Raise attainment of disadvantaged pupils across the wider curriculum

- Since KS2 national tests resumed in May 2022, outcomes for our disadvantaged children have been improving, with proportions of disadvantaged children achieving Age Related Expectations in reading writing and maths combined above national disadvantaged figures.
- Disadvantaged children who are also SEND achieve well and make accelerated progress through the school.
- The attainment of disadvantaged children in wider curriculum subjects in all year groups is strong with pupils being assessed as achieving high levels of Age Related Expectations at the end of the school year.
- The attainment of disadvantaged children in reading, writing and maths in all year groups has demonstrated a year on year increase.

Outcome 4 - Improved social, emotional and mental health of all but particularly our disadvantaged pupils is sustained

- 100% of pupils took part in an extra-curricular offer during the academic year to support their learning and bring learning to life.
- Targeted support including our ELSA interventions for our most vulnerable pupils has secured their ability to access quality-first teaching with a strong success rate.

- Annual Griffin festivals for Science, Sports and the Arts, have included all children with a focus on the inclusion of our most vulnerable.
- Whole school attendance at Kingfisher demonstrates year on year improvement.

Children want to come to school and, as a result of our bespoke support and high expectations, disadvantaged pupils' attendance in 2023/2024 was 3% higher than national figures. Attendance continues to be a priority for 2024/25.
